## **Federal Policy Update**

• President Trump is planning to kick off a "vaccine summit" tomorrow, with an aim to highlight the ongoing efforts underway by the federal government. However, executives

from pharmaceutical companies Pfizer and Moderna – the two companies that have submitted their respective vaccine candidates to the FDA for emergency use authorizations – will not be present at the event.

- The Food & Drug Administration issued an <u>authorization</u> for the first combined, at-home test for COVID-19 and the flu, with samples to be self-collected at home and then mailed to Quest Diagnostics for analysis.
- The Federal Aviation Administration announced that they are "prepared to evaluate the use of each vaccine by medical certificate holders as soon as an emergency-use authorization is issued" for a possible coronavirus vaccine.

## **State Update**

- The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced that they would grant over \$2 million to Connecticut and nearly \$12 million to Rhode Island in COVID-19 related aid.
- Wyoming Governor Mark Gordon (R) issued a new COVID-19 response plan, which requires face coverings to be work in public indoor settings. However, the plan offers a caveat that certain counties "can opt out of the requirements if local conditions move to safer levels in accordance with White House metrics."
- Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer (D) announced that the state would extend its partial lockdown through December 20<sup>th</sup>.
- The California government announced that they would launch a contact tracing app developed by Google and Apple to track the spread of cases in the state.
- New York Governor Andrew Cuomo (D) ordered hospitals in the state to increase their capacity by 25%, due to the spike in coronavirus cases.
- The territory of Puerto Rico is implementing new coronavirus restrictions, including imposing a lockdown on Sundays and banning the sale of alcohol on the weekends. These restrictions will run through January 7<sup>th</sup>.

# **Global Response**

- World Health Organization Emergencies Programme Director Mike Ryan urged that they
  "would rather avoid mandatory vaccination as a means of getting people vaccinated,"
  adding that the world is "much better served to present people with the data and the
  benefits to let people make up their own minds."
- The German government is reportedly aiming to vaccinate 10 million citizens in the first quarter of 2021.
- The Canadian government announced that they have increased their COVID-19 vaccine from pharmaceutical company Moderna from 20 million doses to 40 million doses.
- The United Kingdom is planning to vaccinate the most at-risk British citizens this month, after their approval of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine last week.

- Denmark Prime Minister Mette Frederikson announced that the country would implement a partial lockdown on 39 of its 98 counties, where their cases are highest. These restrictions include closing schools for 5<sup>th</sup> grade and over, as well as the closing of many public recreational areas.
- The Indonesian government announced that they would be vaccinating 9 million citizens this month with the COVID-19 vaccine being created by China.
- Stelios Petsas, who currently serves as the Spokesperson for the Greek government, announced that the ban on inter-region travel and the ongoing curfews have been extended remaining in effect until January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

## **Economic Update**

 U.S. stocks were volatile today, with the three indices closing with mixed results. The Nasdaq Composite rose by 0.45%, while the S&P 500 fell by 0.19% and the Dow Jones Industrial Average by 0.49%.
